The 20th Biennial Session of the National Convocation was held in Memphis, Tenn., July 25-28, 2008. It was a tremendous event and the women were an integral part of the success of the event. Over 200 women attended the sold-out luncheon. Kathy Jeffries and the Shekinah Glory dancers treated the women to the creative arts ministry of dance and spoken word.

Other highlights:

- Patricia Q Bluitt was installed as the president of the Convocation women.
- Viann Bristow was installed as the president of the National Convocation.
- Rev. Ayanna Johnson preached a powerful and healing message on Monday morning.
- *Just Women*, the new resource for women's ministries was introduced!

We Are Women on a Mission, Sheila P. Spencer

Mission:

Calling an objective or assigned task that somebody believes is her duty to carry out or to which she attaches special importance and devotes special care.

“That woman is on a mission.” You hear that phrase and several images come to mind. One image may be that of a sister called to special journey, a shelter around the corner or an orphanage on the other side of the world. The other image may be of a sister who is simply determined to carry out the task that she has been called to do. In both cases, the phrase gives us images of sisters who are unwavering in completing what they have been called to do. You don’t want to get in the way of a woman on a mission.

This issue will give you inspiration from women who are on a mission from our past, present and our future. God has a plan and design for each of us. What’s your mission?

The following prayer from Melvia Field’s book stands as a tribute to the few named and many unnamed African American women whose memory continue to call the church to it mission. It is a prayer that we can offer in memory of every woman trailblazers, past, present and future. Let’s pray....

“Our souls magnify the Lord and our spirits rejoice in God our savior....that we recall those women who came to this land not on the

deck of a ship, but in the dark hold of the slave ship, who preserved an African heritage and understood the liberating message of the Christian gospel; who knew the double jeopardy of being black and female.

That we are heirs of those women who call the church to accept new forms of leadership even today; that we are all of these women and more who seek to serve you, our Lord, we offer this prayer of thanksgiving and gratitude. We are many, and yet we are one. We are bound

together as women. We are a part of the family of God. We are empowered for mission because of these women. Thank you God. In the name of Jesus we pray. Amen.”

Meet your past—Sarah Lue Bostick, excerpt from Streamers

Sarah Lue Bostick, beloved and respected Disciples of Christ preacher, educator and leader, was born near Glasgow, KY in 1868. This trailblazer was known for her compassionate spirit and ability to motivate all people to work together. She attended college in Arkansas in 1888 where she met and married Minister Mancil Bostick. Both were ordained to ministry by the Christian Church. They preached together in black, white and mixed congregations. In spite of bigotry, Sarah’s dedication to Christ, perseverance and loving spirit allowed to build bridges.



These bridges allowed her to found schools to serve the educational needs of African American students. Her interests were The Southern Christian Institute in Mississippi, Jacob Kenoly’s mission school in Liberia, and Jarvis College in Texas, which she helped start. Sarah founded the first African American Christian Women’s Board of Missions (the Negro Christian Missions Board – NCMB) and was responsible for organizing African Americans across the country for missions.

This woman of God committed her life to the service of others. After she died in 1948, her Will designated money painstakingly saved to help the people she loved, with \$100 each going to support Jarvis College and Southern Christian Institute and \$50 to her home church.

We are here because of the bridges we have crossed. Sarah Lue Bostick was a bridge.

Betty's Eyes, Monique Crain

Minister Monique Crain was part of a group of 12 seminarians who visited Venezuela. The group was led by Rev. Julia Brown Karimu, Global Ministries Mission Personnel Executive, and Rev. Carmelo Alvarez, a Global Ministries Missionary to Venezuela. During this journey they met with the leaders and congregations of the Evangelical Pentecostal Union of Venezuela. Monique shared how this was a transforming experience. That's what happens to women on a mission. One of the sisters in Christ had a profound impact on Monique. This encounter inspired Monique to pen this poem: (Venezuela is the site for the 2009 Woman-to-Woman Worldwide experience.)

I see such stories in her eyes as I've seen in my own
 Like when I've looked in the mirror after a long cry
 There are few words to describe them, but if they could speak they'd moan
 Stories of sadness and struggle sprinkled with hope
 A faith that resounds beyond her oppression
 Those eyes, so loving and yet serious, watered by the fortitude it takes to cope
 How is it that I'm a guest in her home, but feel I should be serving her?
 Perhaps it's the magnitude of her poverty?



No, they're Betty's eyes that petition me to her spirit, the presence of something Greater
 They say I need help, but expect nothing.
 I've trained myself to be numb through suffering.
 My silence is my singing and my worship is my being.
 Betty's eyes, those eyes, my eyes, our eyes . . .
 Telling it all, all that we'd dare not tell
 Showering my soul with her despair
 I do not know her truth, only what's been shared
 But I see it, I feel it, it's all there
 In her eyes, I've seen it before
 Yes, it's the awaiting of something promised, something more.
