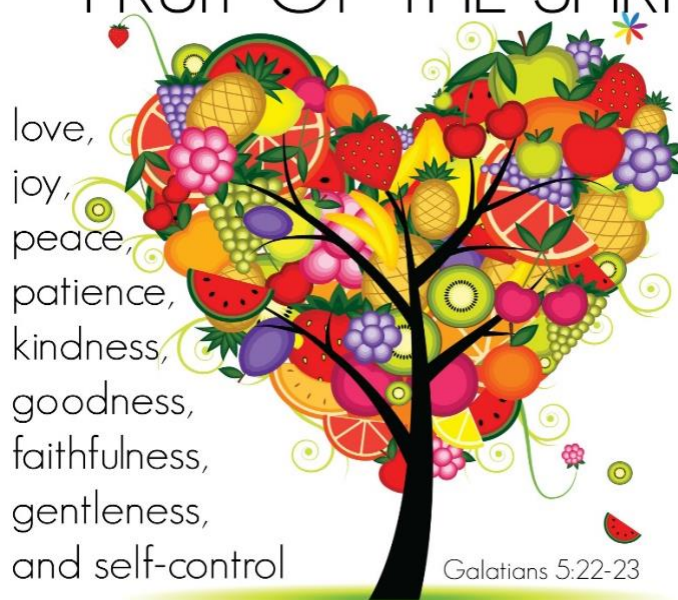

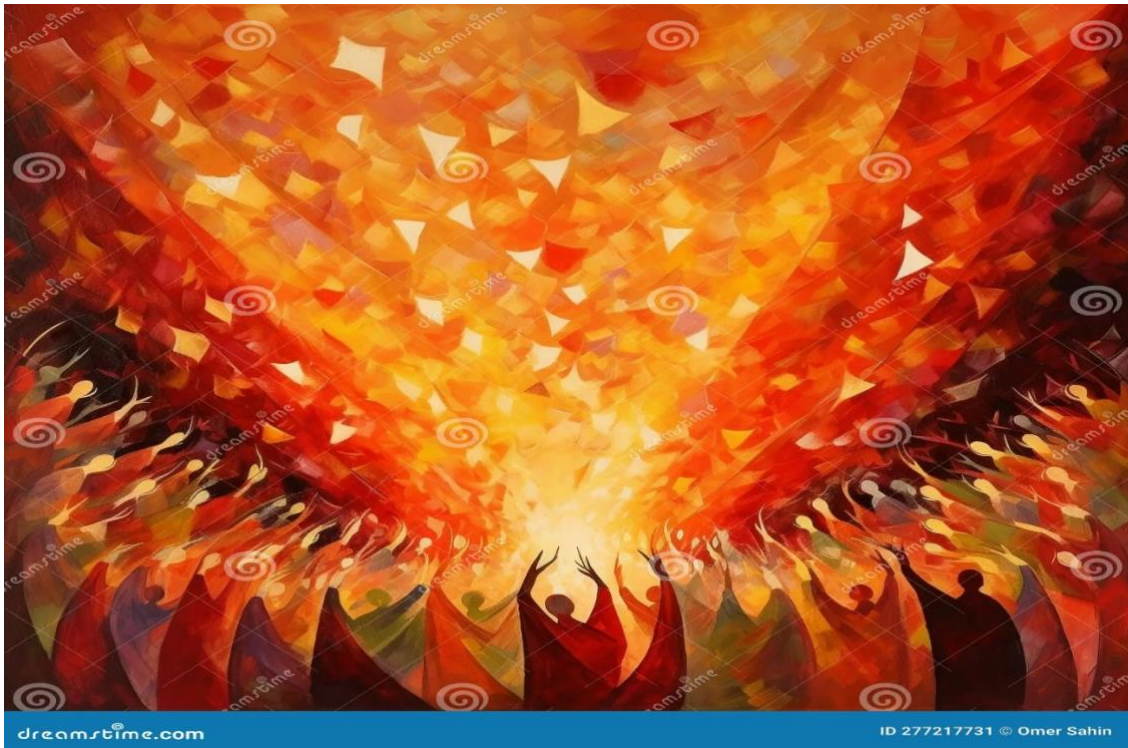

The Gift of God's Spirit



Scriptures:

John 14:15 “If you love me, keep my commands. 16 And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever— 17 the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you.

25 All this I have spoken to you while I am still with you. 26 But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have told you.

I Corinthians 3:16 Do you not know that you yourselves are God's temple, and that God's Spirit dwells in you?

Reflection:

1. What does it mean that you are God's temple? How does that impact you?

2. Have you ever been in a situation where you felt God's spirit speaking to you? or through you to someone else? (You know how you suddenly realize something...or you say something wise or insightful to someone and you don't even know where it came from?)

3. What does it mean to you...how does it change you...to know that the Divine...the very image of God lives in YOU?

4. What does it then mean to know that the same Divine Spirit lives in every person?

The fruit of the Spirit is ... LOVE



In Galatians 5, St. Paul names *Love* as the first fruit of God's Spirit. In Corinthians, he details lots of dos and don'ts about living in *Love*.

Scripture

1 Corinthians 13: 4-8

Love is patient. Love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails.

John 14:27

²⁷ Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

Paul used the Greek word “Eirini” which can mean “peace between individuals; harmony, concord.” Peace in this verse can also mean more than just the absence of war or something felt in the mind. It can also be a way of living life in a proper relationship between human and God, as well as human and human.

Psalm 27:1, 8-13

The Fruit of the Spirit Is... GOODNESS.



Kindness is the disposition that moves us to treat others in a gentle and considerate way. Goodness also involves kindness toward others, but it includes an aspect of moral integrity and generosity that seeks to inspire, encourage and support others in living a better life. The word Paul uses for goodness is defined as "virtue equipped at every point."

Luke 4: 16-21

Then Jesus went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day, he went as usual to the synagogue. He stood up to read the Scriptures and was handed the book of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it is written:

*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because He anointed me to bring good news to the poor.*

*He has sent me to proclaim release to captives,
and recovery of sight to the blind;*

to set free those who are oppressed;

To announce the year when the Lord will save his people.

Jesus rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. All the people in the synagogue had their eyes fixed on him. He began speaking to them, 'This passage of scripture has come true today as you heard it being read.'

Reflection:

Jesus embodied and made manifest the Spirit of God's Eternal Goodness. The same Spirit anoints us to inspire, encourage and support others to taste and see God's Goodness in our lives today. What examples do we find in scripture of Jesus living into this proclamation?

In what ways can a person be "poor" besides financially?

What can hold a person "captive" in our society today?

What kinds of things can we be "blind" to in life?

Feelings of oppression take many forms. What kind of burdens can be oppressive?

In what ways can you announce the Good News of God's Saving Grace by your words or example to others every day?

Prayer: Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers. Galatians 6: 9-10

Scripture:

Exodus 2:23-24

²³ During that long period, the king of Egypt died. The Israelites groaned in their slavery and cried out, and their cry for help because of their slavery went up to God. ²⁴ God heard their groaning and he remembered his covenant with Abraham, with Isaac and with Jacob.

2 Corinthians 11:24-28

²⁴ Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was pelted with stones, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ²⁶ I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my fellow Jews, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false believers. ²⁷ I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. ²⁸ Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches.

Romans 8:28

²⁸ And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

The fruit of the Spirit is...GENTLENESS.



"Be kind to each other. It is better to commit faults with gentleness than to work miracles with unkindness." - Mother Teresa

Scripture:

Philippians 4:5: Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near.

Colossians 3:12: Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience.

1 Peter 3:15

But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect.

Matthew 11:28-29

28 Come to me all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. 29 Take my yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

Reflection:

1839 George Washington Bethune – Dutch Reformed pastor in the United States observed: "Perhaps no grace is less prayed for, or less cultivated, than gentleness." His

words still ring true today. As Christians, we often lack the gentleness we desperately need. We may hardly even notice its absence.

If we undervalue gentleness, or meekness, it's likely because we misunderstand it. Perhaps we think of it as a sort of spinelessness or weakness, as if to be gentle or meek is to lie down and let others wipe their feet on us. But a better, more biblical way to think of gentleness is as *strength under control*. This is the gentleness the Scriptures describe in our triune God and in His servants, like the apostle Paul. It involves a Godward dimension of submission to the Lord in all of His Word and works, and it involves a human dimension in the consideration of others. Such humble strength is what God expects of and supplies to all His people.

Prayer: Lord Jesus Christ, produce in me the fruit of a gentle spirit.

The Fruit of the Spirit is...SELF CONTROL.



Scripture:

Proverbs 25:28

Like a city whose walls are broken through
is a person who lacks self-control.

1 Peter 4:7-8

⁷The end of all things is near. Therefore, be alert and of sober mind so that you may pray. ⁸Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins.

James 1:19-20

¹⁹My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, ²⁰because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires.

Psalms 141:3-5

Set a guard over my mouth, Lord;
keep watch over the door of my lips.

⁴Do not let my heart be drawn to what is evil
so that I take part in wicked deeds
along with those who are evildoers;
do not let me eat their delicacies.

⁵Let a righteous man strike me—that is a kindness;

let him rebuke me—that is oil on my head.
My head will not refuse it,
for my prayer will still be against the deeds of evildoers.

1 Corinthians 9:24-27

²⁴ Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. ²⁵ Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. ²⁶ Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. ²⁷ No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize.
